Military personnel deployed at Dyess
 ABILENE, Texas (AP) — Some military personnel at Dyess Air Force Base have been deployed, but officials will not say how many people were deployed, where they were sent or what they will do. "We repositioned some of our military personnel where required to prepare and support the president's campaign against terrorism," said base spokesman Capt. Dave Honchul Monday. He said the personnel received deployment orders last week, but would not say when. Honchul also said the base has sent some aircraft to Ellsworth Air Force Base in Rapid City, S.D. He would not say what aircraft or how many were sent. Dyess has 40 of the nation's 93 B-1 bombers. Near San Antonio, personnel from the Air Intelligence Agency at Lackland Air Force Base were called up over the weekend, agency spokesman Dom Cardonita said. The Air Education and Training Command at Randolph AFB, near San Antonio, also had some personnel activated, spokesman Dave Smith said Monday. Neither Cardonita nor Smith would cite a specific number of personnel affected. The 433rd Airlift Wing, an Air Force reservist unit at Lackland, has been authorized by the Pentagon to activate some of the security personnel, spokesman Lt. Col. Meade Warthen said Monday. Warthen said none of the security forces have yet been activated. He said he did not know how many people might be called.

Council's recommendation only 30 minutes before the full Council convened to consider the matter.

Rowan was denied an opportunity to speak before the MSC Council, whose members determined Rowan's fate.

Ben Moffitt, MSC executive vice president for marketing and a junior political science major, said the MSC Council will review Southerland's recommendations to correct personnel procedures. "We believe we followed the processes outlined in the MSC constitution and bylaws," Moffitt said. "We're not perfect, and we'll take Southerland's report into consideration."

Rowan has accused Moffitt and Barry Hammond, MSC executive vice president for development and a junior finance major, of orchestrating his removal. Both were participants in the trip to Italy and sat on the council that voted for his removal. Hammond and Moffitt said Monday that they will not seek the presidency vacancy.

On Friday, Rowan's last day as MSC president, the telephone answering message in his MSC office began, "Howdy, you've reached Ben Hammond for student body president campaign headquarters."

Rowan denies leaving the message. "I just packed all my things Thursday night and left," Rowan said. "I've closed that chapter in my life and the last thing I want is for this to drag on any further."

An open application process for selecting a new MSC president will begin, Moffitt said, and Jennifer Brashares, MSC executive vice president for programs and a senior sociology major, will assume the duties of MSC president until a permanent replacement is chosen.

Rowan said that despite his shortened tenure he is proud of his accomplishments as MSC president, such as encouraging more ethnic diversity among MSC committees and improving relations between the MSC and other student organizations.

"In any leadership role, the ultimate goal is to impact people, and I think I succeeded," Rowan said.
