Affleck caught driving 114 mph, fine of more than \$1,000

SOPERTON, Ga. (AP) — Ben Affleck was stopped by sheriff's deputies after he was clocked driving 114 mph on a Georgia interstate, said the actor's publicist Monday.

Affleck, star of *Pearl Harbor*, paid a \$1,114 fine and was allowed to go on his way, publicist David

Pollick said. Affleck was not arrested, he added. Pollick said the 29-year-old actor, who was on vacation, was driving a black Cadillac when he was stopped by a Treutlen County deputy about 10 miles last Wednesday. The speed limit is 70 mph.

Treutlen Sheriff's Deputy Sidney Love said Affleck followed a sheriff's deputy to the county jail, where the actor paid his fine and was released in less than 20 minutes.

Affleck was driving west on I-16, which connects the middle Georgia city of Macon to Savannah on the coast.

Earlier this year, Affleck voluntarily entered a live-in rehabilitation facility in Malibu, Calif., for alcohol abuse.

This is the rush of madness *Machine* gives.

"Otsego Undead," lyrically dubious meanings, but musically is a nice contrast of hell-bent guitar chords against a trance-like keyboard solo commonly associated with some genres of rave music. The intro for "Structural Defect," seems stolen, or if it prefers a softer euphemism, borrowed from Pantera's "Cowboys From Hell." The song continues along this line of ripping-off and never gets off the ground in a meaningful way. This is a track easily forgotten.

The title track, "Machine," has Ministry-esque chant-like qualities that chills blood. While listeners may have no idea what the words are saying, they may feel like they are being far and fast.

There is no real musical redemption on this album. *Machine* is all music, however, in that it exists to evoke a mood. If elevator music to hell was their goal, Static-X succeeded evily. (Grade: B-)

Right around the corner is registration for Spring 2002, and this year we've added registration over the Web.


