

NY man pleads guilty to rape in Internet kidnap case

NEW YORK (AP) — A man pleaded guilty Tuesday to repeatedly raping a 15-year-old girl who said she was abducted from Massachusetts by two other people and held hostage for a week in New York.

Michael Montez, 35, of New York, faces a minimum of nine years in prison at his Nov. 19 sentencing, according to a postcard to everyone in the nation explaining the criteria for spotting a suspicious piece of mail.

"If you receive something which looks funny, do not shake, bump or sniff it," Ward said. "Wash your hands and then call 911."

Once an individual comes in contact with the anthrax bacteria, it can have an incubation period of about seven days, she added. "A treatment of drugs needs to start right after the first signs appear," Moyes said. "Antibiotics kill some of the time, but due to toxins the antibiotic can sometimes have no effect."

Ward said approximately thirty parcels have been collected in Bryan-College Station and surrounding areas, most turning out to be scam and diet letters, Ward said.

was set to cancel Bonfire.

"I've been frustrated in the past because student leaders have not stood up to the administration, but this time students want to get out and do something about it," Long said. "I want it to be known that students overwhelmingly support Bonfire, and that we're more than willing to work with Bowen to make this happen."

Other students signing the letter include Jorge Barrera, president of the Residence Hall Association, Beth Weems, 2002 class council president, Chris Durham, 2003 class council president, 13 student senators and more than 20 others.

Dr. Bowen, we urge you to do everything in your power to make sure that an Aggie Bonfire burns in 2002.

We accepted a two year hiatus, agreeing that it would be best for Texas A&M. Now it is time to proceed," the letter states. "Please do whatever it takes to fulfill your commitment to an Aggie Bonfire in 2002. Don't extinguish the Bonfire flame forever."

In 2000 Bowen said Bonfire would return in 2002 but under strict parameters — including a single-tier stack, professionally cut logs and a design by licensed engineers. Planning for Bonfire is underway, but efforts to finalize a design have been hindered by the University's inability to find a safety firm. Two firms have already backed out of

negotiations, citing liability issues and lack of student involvement.

Bowen is set to decide in January whether Bonfire 2002 will occur.

Student Body President Schuyler Houser, a senior industrial engineering major, said she was unaware of the letter but that as Bowen nears a final decision on Bonfire, it is important students share their views and concerns with administrators.

"I think this is the sort of feedback the University wants, and I really hope students pay attention to what's going on and give their input," Houser said.

Bowen and other University officials have made every effort to ensure a safe Bonfire that includes student support and participation, Houser said.
