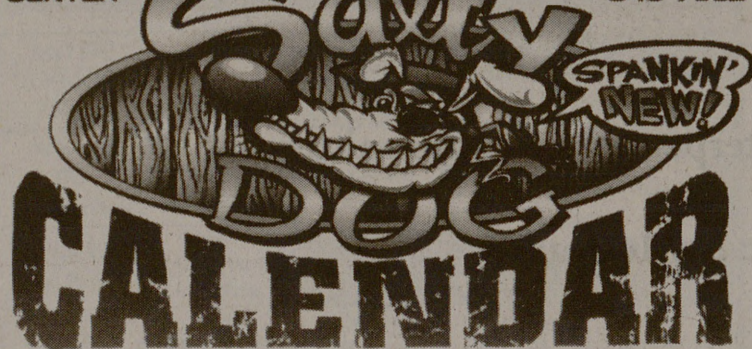
Qualifications for editor in chief of *The Battalion* are:

- Be a Texas A&M student in good standing with the University and enrolled in at least six credit hours (4 if a graduate student) during the term of office (unless fewer credits are required to graduate);
- Have at least a 2.00 cumulative grade point ratio (3.00 if a graduate student) and at least a 2.00 grade point ratio (3.00 if a graduate student) in the semester immediately prior to the appointment, the semester of appointment and semester during the term of office. In order for this provision to be met, at least six hours (4 if a graduate student) must have been taken for that semester;
- Have completed JOUR 301 (Mass Communication, Law and Society), or equivalent;

registered voter in Ogden's district. In his publication, a clear definition of each amendment is listed, as well as a positive and negative argument for each.

"We sent a voter's guide to every registered voter in District Five, and if you didn't receive one, we've got plenty here," Ogden said.

The senator estimates that approximately 275,000 guides were sent out by his office. He added that his voter's guide, as well as the Texas Women's Voter's Guide, can be taken with into any voting booth to help voters remember which amendments they want to vote for in the election.

Early voting will be today and Friday from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Regular voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 6. There are 44 voting locations in the Brazos Valley, with 16 sites in College Station. There will be one voting location on the A&M campus in room 147 of the Memorial Student Center. To be able to vote, you must be a registered voter in Brazos County and you must bring your voter card or valid Texas driver's license.

and masks, and in the Bryan Post Offices, roughly 30 of the 230 employees wear gloves and masks, Kimbrough said.

"The masks and gloves are not mandatory," Kimbrough said. "But they are strongly recommended."

If there is a suspected case of anthrax in College Station, the College Station police and fire departments are the first to respond.

Lt. Dan Jones, CSPD spokesman, said there are several things done when the department receives a call about a possible anthrax case.

"We first send a police offi-

Steve Miller, assistant sports information director, said an organization that applies for a media pass is granted one depending on space availability. Publications that "cover A&M first" are given higher priority, Miller said.

Aggie Review representatives have also attended several media luncheons at Cain Hall in which media representatives can eat for free on Tuesdays and talk with players and coaches.

"Our sports editor applied for a pass like everyone else," Samuelson said. "We have a sports page because we have people who are interested in writing about sports and we are

lucky to have a sports editor who is motivated and has political beliefs and is actually doing his job."

Media passes for events on campus are given out on a case by case basis, said University Relations Deputy Director Lane Stephenson.

"It really is as long as they are a bona fide media representative by a recognized media organization," Stephenson said.

In February, three *Aggie Review* members attended a lecture on the Gulf War by former President George Bush, sitting in the reserved media section, even though a story was never published. Tickets for the event were free to students, but the Memorial Student Center Box Office quickly ran out of tickets for the event.

"It was our editorial policy to not print the story, but it didn't need to be," Samuelson said. "We can't publish everything we send to. Besides, we had to be going to attend regional events."

Stephenson said University had not had major problems with media passes.

No one has attended sports-related media events in a year, Samuelson said.

"As an Aggie, I'm not getting media passes for no reason," she said. "Why would I obtain a pass? I was not interested in a minor event. I have had hiatus from beginning and everything done their job."

to hear something from the firm, a response that Cole says they have not gotten.

"They have not come back to us with concerns about the agreement, they have not said if there are any problems, they have not gotten back to us at all," Cole said.

In an altered time frame that hinges on when the safety firm joins the Bonfire planning team, Cole said the Bonfire steering committee may decide to wait to present the plans to students until the first two weeks of the Spring 2002 semester.

"It depends on how fast they can do their work, once they get on board," Cole said. "But were not

going to sacrifice safety."

Cole said planners are also not going to reveal the amount of time students will have to review final plans on the Bonfire 2002 Website. A safety consultant needs longer than the time before final exams this December to make designs and help narrow them down to the designs students would be looking at, Cole said he will wait until spring to post the designs on the Website.

"It's going to be tough, but we don't want students to lose out or be busy with finals and have a chance to see them [the designs]," he said. Last week, Cole said his major concern was having a final design ready to present to students by the end of the semester.

"We've got 80 percent of the stuff in place," he said. "We're just waiting, waiting for that safety

cer and a fire department HAZMAT (hazardous material) tech out to each incident to evaluate the situation before making a command decision," Jones said. "They then evaluate the item as 'open and exposed' or 'un-open and sealed.'"

Jones said that if the team finds an item, such as a letter or package, opened or unopened with possible contamination, the HAZMAT tech would place the item in a secure sealed bag.

They would transport that item to a secure holding area within the College Station Police Department for retrieval from a postal inspector in Houston within 48 hours for further testing if the package is unopened.

"If the package is opened and

has possible contamination, the HAZMAT tech is to secure enough material for testing and to sterilize the area with a solution of water and bleach," Jones said. "The material collected is

then sent to a lab for the Department of Health in Austin for further testing."

Jones said that there have

been about 25 opened unopened items collected by CSPD sent to labs or postal inspectors in Houston since the anthrax scare began.

He also said that the department receives one to two calls reporting such items.

"These are ordinary concerned people," Jones said. "There has not been reported hoaxes in College Station so far."

Jones made it clear that the department will not be tolerating such items.

"A hoax will be treated as a terrorist investigation, and an investigation of that magnitude will bring forces that he or she will not be expecting."

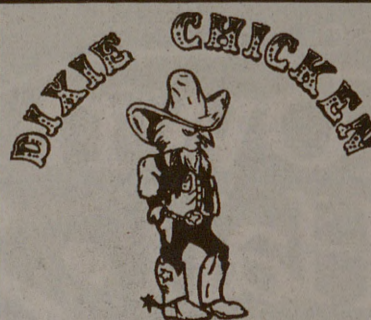
