NEW YORK (AP) Baseball fans, meet the first Mr. November — Derek Jeter.

Four minutes after midnight, Jeter earned that distinction by hitting a home run with two outs in the bottom of 10th inning to lift the New York Yankees over the Arizona Diamondbacks 4-3 and tie the World Series at two games each.

Tino Martinez saved the Yankees on Wednesday night with a two-out, two-run homer in the ninth off Byung-Hyun Kim, who had relieved a gutsy Curt Schilling.

Then Jeter, who usually shines in October, connected off




