# Students discuss plans for furthering educati

As graduation nears, some students are concerned about life in the "real world," while others realize that their time at school is not over yet - they still have graduate or professional school ahead.

For many students, graduate or professional school gives them a guarantee to succeed in their chosen profession. Others want to continue their education after college because of a passion to continue learning.

Dr. Douglas Starr, a professor of journalism, said a master's degree often will get one a higher salary and higher raises during his or her career. He said a bachelor's degree usually is not enough. 'Hundreds

thousands of job seekers have only the bachelor's degree," Starr said. "The master's degree puts you at the head of the line.'

Dr. Clifton Griffin, the director for the Office of Graduate Studies, said the number of graduate school applicants increases during tough economic times. Yet in spite of ambitious students desiring higher education, the task of preparing for graduate school can be stressful. Some students have known they want to continue their education after college and have researched and prepared, while others only are beginning their search.
