helped administer first aid.

Two hours later, a suicide bomber walked into a paramedics' dispatch station in the Jewish settlement of Efrat in the West Bank and detonated his explosives. The attacker died and four medics were wounded, including a trainee who was in serious condition.

President Bush, who has defended Israel's offensive, condemned Sunday's bombings and said they would not "deter him from the pursuit of peace," White House spokesman Gordon Johndroe said.

In Ramallah, under Israeli control since Friday, dozens of European peace activists, their arms raised and holding white flags, marched past bewildered Israeli soldiers into Yasser Arafat's office to protest the confinement of the Palestinian leader by Israel. The protesters said they would stay with Arafat, who has accused Israel of trying to kill him, human shields.

Earlier in the day, Israeli forces surrounding the building exchanged fire with Arafat's guards, and Palestinian officials said Arafat was just a few yards from the fighting. Several guards were wounded, two of them seriously. At least 13 Palestinians and two Israeli soldiers have been killed in Ramallah since Friday.

Robert Gates, former head of the Bush School and former director of the CIA, is scheduled to visit today.

Two more candidates who remain unidentified are also in the running Regent officials said. The A&M System Board of Regents will announce the new president in June, when President Dr. Ray M. Bowen will step down.

Whitmore earned his bachelor's of arts and master's in speech and theater from Washington State University. While at the University of Texas, he said he helped in a \$31 million fund raising effort for the liberal arts program and would be comfortable with the role of a fundraiser that a president must play, since fine arts departments rely on private funds.

According to search committee chair Dr. John Junkins, Whitmore has grown up in academics and demonstrated a strong career.

"He has made his mark everywhere and has many outstanding accomplishments," Junkins said.

One other goal Whitmore said he has would be to increase the diversity of the University so that the student body, faculty and staff reflect the Texas population.

During his three-day visit to Texas A&M, Whitmore said he has experienced excellence in the classroom as well as athletic programs.

"This is a University full of energy, vitality and hope for the future," he said.

some more than others.

The first group affected juniors, who begin interviewing for internships week. Although the elimination of Andersen reduces number of interview options for many students, Benjamin said he feels students interviewing campus this week will internships.

"All the other firms are coming (to interview), and expect all our students to get internships," Benjamin said. "There are plenty of other firms."

The second group affected will be those students coming back from current internships with Andersen, who either offered permanent or expected job offers or graduation in May 2003.

"The question is whether Arthur Andersen can hold those commitments year," Benjamin said. Arthur Andersen can honor the commitments, feel good that they will be able to get jobs."

Most importantly, A&M's business school look at the third group of students affected. Many students, who interned with Andersen last spring and be graduating this May, offered permanent positions beginning this summer.

Benjamin said if Andersen cannot give graduating students jobs, these students will be scrambling to find jobs between now, May 15, and August graduation date.

"The problem is we don't know what's going to happen and we are dealing with a messy period of time," Benjamin said. "We are going to do everything we can to help them if they don't have permanent job commitments."

Benjamin also said accounting departments are going through a process to graduate accounting seniors if Andersen loses its status as a viable company files bankruptcy.

"Now the big question is whether Arthur Andersen continues a viable organization."
