Biographical Sketches:
Richard W. Stadelmann is an associate professor of Philosophy and Humanities at Texas A&M University. He holds a M.Div. in Religious Studies - Philosophical Theology from Yale University. He teaches a variety of courses, including Near Eastern Religions, Military Ethics, Concepts of Love, Introduction to New Testament, and Contemporary Moral Issues. His principle research interests are in Old Testament, New Testament, Indian and Oriental Religions, Near Eastern Religions, Philosophy of Religion, Philosophy of Love, Metaphysics, Logic, History of Modern Philosophy, Ethics, Contemporary Moral Issues, Epistemology, American Philosophy, Existentialism, Plato, Augustine, History of Christianity, Mysticism.
Zeki Saritoprak holds a Ph.D. in Islamic Theology from the University of Marmara, Turkey. He earned his Master's degree in Islamic Theology and Philosophy, and his B.A. in Divinity from the same university. He also attended Al-Azhar University in Cairo for several years while researching for his dissertation. He researched and taught courses at Harran University (Turkey), Georgetown University, the Catholic University of America, and the Indiana School of Languages. Some of the subjects he has taught include the science of Kalam, World Religions, Biblical Elements in the Qur'an, Sufism, Islamic sects, contemporary Islamic movements, al-Ghazali, Said Nursi, and interfaith dialogue. Currently, he teaches World Religions at Berry College, Department of Religion and Philosophy.
Rev. Kathleen Ellis is in her ninth year as minister of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. She graduated from SMU's Perkins School of Theology and was ordained in 1993. She is married and has two adult sons.

"It is so important to get tested for [chlamydia and gonorrhea] if you have ever had unprotected sex, because they are curable, but can cause sterility if left untreated," Griffith said.

Having a visual exam can also identify certain infections, Griffith said, and appointments to see a health care provider are free for students at Beutel.

"We really encourage the testing

because it is so important, and the health care providers are very understanding," said assistant health education coordinator Alyssa Wommack.

Protection from these infections is also supported by Beutel, Griffith said, and condoms are available next to the pharmacy in the basement of Beutel, and cost \$2 for 10 condoms.

"We don't only encourage testing, but we also encourage students to use protection from these infections, but of course the best protection is abstinence," Wommack said.
