"Due to the statistics on e-book use, the University is optimistic about expanding this option in the future," Ramirez said.

John Fullerton, a reference desk clerk at Evans Library, said despite the convenience of e-books, libraries still will be an essential research tool for students. The selection of e-books is much more limited than the library's selection of

books, and most students would rather read books in paper form than off a computer screen, Fullerton said.

The e-books promotion week, April 15 to April 19, was targeted at informing students of the advantages of e-books and their availability.

"Inquiries seem to indicate that people off campus are very interested in utilizing this option," Ramirez said.

"I think this affects our quality of life."

Those opposed to the ordinance said it is unnecessary for the city simply should enforce the parking and noise already on the books.

The ordinance, opponents said, would deter students from leases in Bryan and eliminate revenue generated from those.

Doug Pederson, owner of Twin City Properties, said Bryan fought for Blinn College, but the ordinance threatens economic benefits.

"We wanted college students here," Pederson said. "What do we have?"

The council must approve the ordinance at a second meeting before it is officially adopted.


