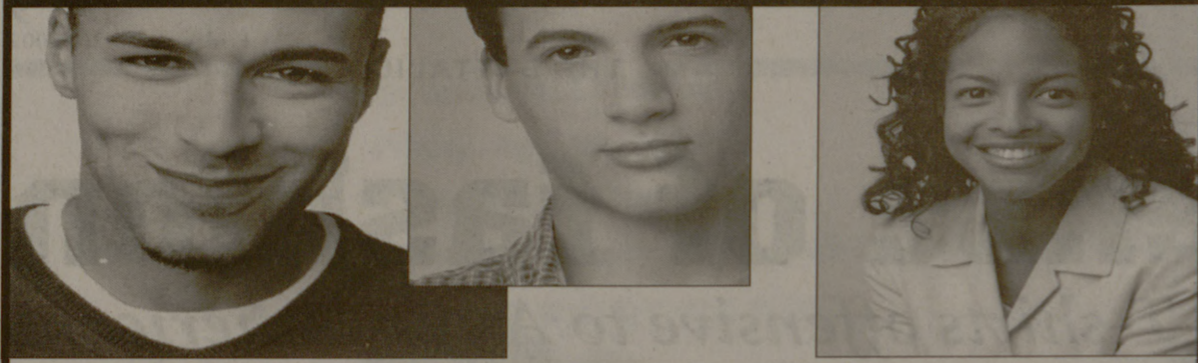

Ags host Mizzou in three-game series

The Texas A&M baseball team looks to snap a three-game losing streak when the Aggies host Missouri in a weekend set at Olsen Field. First pitch Friday is set for 7 p.m. while Saturday's doubleheader will begin at 2 p.m. 19th-ranked A&M (31-16, 10-8 Big 12) has lost three straight, including the final two games at No. 15 Baylor and a single game

Tuesday against second-ranked Rice. The Tigers (20-19, 7-10) are coming off a midweek win over St. Louis in which the Missouri pitchers combined to shutout the Billikens, 10-0, in a game that was played using wooden bats. Last weekend the Tigers beat Kansas, 16-10 and 14-4, in a Sunday doubleheader.

every two years, Zorn is still the reigning champion.

In the finals of the singles competition, eighth-seeded Zorn shot against third-seeded Fatima Agudo of Spain.

After finishing regulation tied, 115-115, the two went to a one-arrow shoot off, archery's equivalent of having fourth-and-goal from the 2-yard line with one second on the clock.

Shooting at a distance of 20 yards, Zorn went first.

"The whole meet came down to one arrow," Zorn said. "It was either do or die, and you have 40 seconds. Outwardly, I wasn't very nervous, but I was having a pretty hard time functioning."

With the 40-second clock ticking down, Zorn pulled back but had trouble staying steady.

"I pulled back and held it, but it wasn't going to go in the middle at all. So I had to let down."

By letting her bow down, Zorn had to start her shot all over again, all while the

clock kept ticking. With 17 seconds left she pulled her bow back again.

Unlike a basketball player shooting a free throw, archers shooting at a target aim for several seconds before firing. By letting down from her initial draw, Zorn was forced to rush through her shooting routine.

From her position at full draw, she could not see the clock counting down, but the crowd behind her let her know how much time she had left, rhythmically following the countdown.

Five, Four, Three, Two ... Fire.

It was the perfect shot, slicing into the 10-ring — about the size of a nickel — on the target.

Agudo barely missed matching Zorn, firing a nine-point shot with her arrow and giving Zorn the individual indoor world championship.

"(A&M head coach) Kathy (Eissinger) and the other coach on the team were behind me and came up and grabbed me, because I was about to shake myself into falling over," Zorn said. "I shook for about a day

from all the adrenaline."

Now in her second year at A&M, Zorn is faced with the challenge of repeating her national freshman year.

Eissinger, the head coach at A&M, said she did not take too active of a hand in coaching Zorn's technique. Most of that is left to assistant coach Randy Rutledge, who coached Zorn's mother, Mary, and her mom. Eissinger's coaching comes mostly in the form of guidance.

"I pretty much just let her do her own thing," Eissinger said. "I mainly offer advice here and there, more in the way of suggestions rather than saying I have to do this."

The road back to the top has not been easy this season, as Zorn battled a prolonged sickness as well as a few injuries and defeats, including a quarterfinal loss at the Arizona Cup a few weeks ago.

"The plan is to do it all again," Zorn said. "That's the plan. It might not work, that's why I love archery, to continue to play. You don't have to win every time."

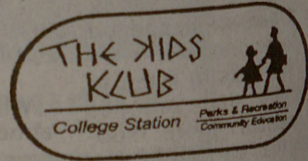
