 information on its weapons program and to open all including presidential palaces for the inspectors. The resolution reportedly would then military action against Saddam if the inspections fail.
 The French insist on a two-stage approach, starting with resolution on inspections. A second would be drawn up only inspections fail.
 Nearly four years inspectors hunting for evidence of nuclear, biological and chemical weaponry withdrew the Iraq on the eve of U.S.-British airstrikes amid allegations Baghdad wasn't cooperating with the teams.
 "We're certainly aware what happened last time," Fleming said Sunday. "But we were successful last time, and we dismantled program, and we dismantled we were unfettered access, we we be successful again."
 "We're looking for cooperation here, but these are not political talks," she said. "We're not going to be negotiating here. We're going to laying on the table the requirements we're going to have inspectors."
 The Bush administration seeking to build support for invasion of Iraq, has cast doubt on the inspectors' requirement: that they be given freedom to examine whatever they wish, including Saddam's eight sprawling presidential palaces, which up to now have been off-limits.
 Under a 1998 deal worked between Iraq and U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan to keep on-and-off mission going, inspectors were shut out of palaces, which encompass a total of about 12 square miles.
 The weapons inspectors closed-door talks, which will through Tuesday, could provide the first glimpse into whether Saddam, who denies that he has weapons of mass destruction, is serious about letting inspectors go where they please.
 Blix, whose New York-based team handles the U.N. hunt for biological and chemical agents will be joined by Jacques Baute, head of the IAEA nuclear team, and a middle Iraqi delegation.
 Both sides will discuss where the teams will be based in Iraq, how they will operate once on the ground, what types of sites they will demand access to, technical issues such as air landing rights and visas, Fleming said.
