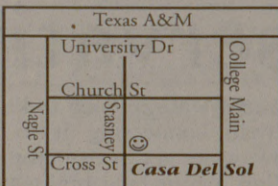

"I've been out there moving around the district non-stop, getting to know people, especially in Brazos (County)," Carter said. Carter has proclaimed himself a staunch supporter of President Bush. He said he would have voted for the recently passed congressional resolution authorizing the president to use military force against Iraq. The United States must take all necessary steps to ensure that Saddam Hussein does not acquire weapons of mass destruction, Carter said.

"We cannot live in a world in which we're held hostage," Carter said.

Carter said he also supports making Bush's tax cuts permanent, set to phase out by 2010. Also, he said, the estate tax should be abolished and the capital gains tax should be reduced to stimulate the economy.

"The less of your money the government has, the better off we are," Carter said.

With the federal government set to dole out large sums of homeland security research dollars, Carter said he will be a tireless advocate for A&M in the fierce competition for research funding. The University has the potential to become the national headquarters for homeland security research.

"A&M has more to offer than any other institution in America," Carter said.

"Their job does not include crowd control," Mills said. "For any student to take that upon himself is improper."

Officers working security on the field did not attempt to follow or chase the Nebraska fans in order to prevent additional people from storming the field, Wiatt said.

Since the incident, some Nebraska students have come forward to report having been assaulted, Wiatt said. Parrott said the UPD has received two complaints from Nebraska by e-mail.

The police department at the University of Nebraska is investigating at least one report of assault and will send the statement to the UPD,

Wiatt said. The statement will then be reviewed and discussed with the county attorney to decide if charges should be filed.

The assault charge that may be filed, a simple assault, is classified as a class C misdemeanor and is comparable to a traffic ticket and punishable by a fine, Wiatt said.

Additionally, students involved in the incident may face consequences from the University.

"If we determine policy violations (in the students' actions), we will certainly pursue disciplinary action," Parrott said.

Students could face consequences as severe as suspension or expulsion or may receive conduct probation, he said.

"There is no justification for violent altercations," Parrott said.

a lecture," Martell said. "The lab was created to meet a very specific training need. It will ensure the quality of portable water and meet the regulatory requirements for wastewater discharge."

The \$300,000 lab will also serve as an emergency response lab. In the event of a hurricane, flood or other disaster that overpowers local water and water treatment facilities, the lab can move to the disaster area to ensure the water is safe to drink and the wastewater is safe to discharge.

This self-contained lab was designed by TEEX's Paul Muraca and Richard Harbuck.

Muraca said that there was a need for this lab because no classroom provided laboratory hands-on training.

"The lab can actually go to the students and give them the opportunity to practice the procedures they would learn in the classroom," Muraca said. "It allows for a small classroom setting."

Three or four classes should be completed using the lab by January, Muraca said.

The mobile lab can be transported to sites across Texas to train citizens to aid in protect-

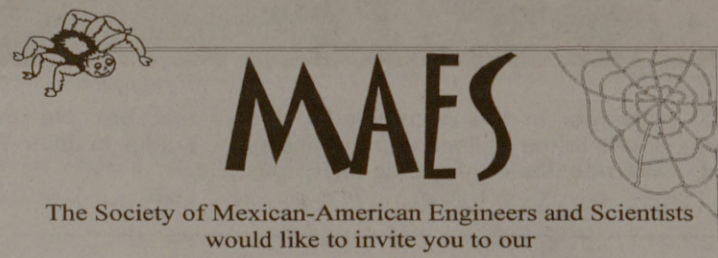
ing the health of their communities, Harbuck said.

"Only a few people are in charge of the health in our community and the lab was built to provide them with a facility where they can learn to do the testing that ensures the quality of our drinking water."

The stand-alone lab was custom built by Champion Trailer Co. in Lewisville, Texas.

It is believed to be the only mobile lab of its type designed for training.

The lab is equipped with an 18,000-watt generator, a solar panel and a 110-volt power cable.

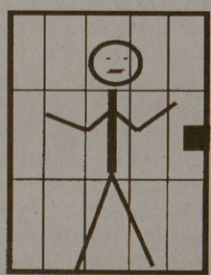
