## Aggies travel to Big 12 Championship

The Texas A&M men's and omen's cross country teams will be making their seventh trip the Big 12 Conference

Championships tomorrow. This year's meet will be hosted by the University of Missouri the A.L. Gustin Golf Course in Columbia, Mo.

The lack of a national ranking, oupled with injuries and some sappointing performances earer in the season, makes this weekend's meet loom ever larger on the Aggies' schedule.

"Any time you run (in) the Big 2 Championships it's a very mportant meet," said head ach Dave Hartman. "It's one of he most important of the year. the Big 12 and qualifying for lationals are big."

The meet not only presents chance for the men and omen to compete against ther teams in the Big 12, but it so gives the squads a chance opick up some crucial at-large pints that can help them in eir drive to receive an atrge bid for Nationals.

"It would build a lot of confience knowing where we are ... oing into regionals. I think if we go out there and run well it'll give s a lot of confidence going into e regional meet," Hartman said.

Perennial power Colorado is heavily favored once again this year on both the men's and women's sides. The women are looking for results similar to

"A lot of teams are real close to each other ... we can be in that mix. It just depends on if we have a good day," Hartman said.

This year the men will be looking to senior Juan Debastos to lead the way. Debastos placed fourth in the Big 12 last year, but has been hampered by injury most of this season.

"Most of the year I was hurt," Debastos said. "But I'm going to try my best to get top five or ten (in the meet) ... I'm not in the same shape as last year, but I think I can make top five. (That) would be a good race.

The men will also depend on junior Tommy Bonn, who, like Debastos, has been slowed by injury this year, as well as standouts junior Andrew Cook and sophomore Jon Lewis, who have both earned Big 12 Runner of the Week honors earlier this year.

"A good performance would feel good," said true freshman Meredith Crane. "It would be really motivational as far as feeling prepared for Regionals ... our hopes will be higher for Regionals and for making Nationals.'
