

## GOP sweeps Texas election

(AP) — The Grand Old Party pulled off a grand display of political power, taking all statewide offices in a Texas-sized show of allegiance for President Bush.

Incumbent Gov. Rick Perry easily won election Tuesday to the post he assumed when Bush was promoted to the White House. State Attorney General John Cornyn was tapped to fill the seat of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who is stepping down.

David Dewhurst moved from the land commissioner's office to lieutenant governor, perhaps the most powerful position in state government.

With most of the votes counted, Perry polled 58 percent to 40 percent for Laredo banker Tony Sanchez, who spent at least \$59 million of his own money. Cornyn had 55 percent to 43 percent for Ron Kirk, the former Dallas mayor who would have been the first black senator from the state.

Sanchez declined to concede late Tuesday because he still expected a close finish - final totals were delayed because of problems counting ballots in two of the state's most populous counties, Bexar and Tarrant. But in a Wednesday morning speech, Sanchez said he had called Perry to congratulate him. Kirk acknowledged Tuesday night that the voters had spoken.

Not this Election Day, when Republicans flexed their muscle across the country. In Texas, they rallied behind their presidential native son, who

appeared in the state as late as Monday to show support for GOP candidates.

Texas Democrats put together a racially charged ticket with a business-friendly attitude, but clearly wasn't enough to offset warm feelings for President Bush. The gubernatorial campaign recent weeks centered on the state's growing business owners' insurance crisis, questions about business dealings and respect for law enforcement.

Cornyn maintained that Kirk is too close to out-of-state liberals and soft on defense. Kirk countered that he forged a bipartisan reputation as mayor and was better suited to work with both parties.

In the race for lieutenant governor, Dewhurst depicted Sharp as an out-of-step liberal, while he touted support from business leaders. Dewhurst paced John Sharp 52 percent to 46 percent.

In legislative races, the GOP won control of the Texas House for the first time in 130 years and retained control of the Texas Senate.

Texans voted on 32 U.S. House races, including six in which an incumbent was without major opposition and three more that were uncontested. The result: Democrats won 17 of the 32 House seats in the Texas delegations with one race still undecided. That was the District 23 race between Republican incumbent Henry Bonilla of San Antonio and Laredo Democrat Henry Cuellar.

## Mass roadkill grave angers officials

STOCKBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — The discovery of a mass grave for roadkill in the median of the Massachusetts Turnpike has outraged officials in this picturesque community.

Town officials said they were unaware that the broad, wooded median held thousands of carcasses of animals killed along the roadway and that the site had apparently been in use for decades, until recently.

"I want to know why the Turnpike Authority would drive dead animals 50 to 100 miles to dump them in our town," said J. Christopher Irsfield, who chairs the Board of Selectmen in Stockbridge. At their Monday night meeting, selectmen directed their attorney to research the disposal site's legality.

Engineers hired by the Turnpike were scheduled to

report to the town's Conservation Commission next week on possible damage to protected wetlands surrounding the site, described by town officials as being 300 feet long, 150 feet wide and 45 feet deep.

Turnpike spokesman

Bliss said Tuesday that the Stockbridge median was the only active central drainage remaining along the road.

The Pike stopped bringing animals there two months ago. Preliminary findings show pollution from the site, estimated to contain the remains of 4,000 deer, bear, moose and other animals, Bliss said. He said the carcasses had been covered with sand and gravel.

Irsfield, who lives near the site, told *The Berkshire Eagle* his dogs had sometimes dug up home huge chunks of deer carcasses that he now had come from the site, and neighbors said they had smelled.
