Along with the new name and new mission, Transportation Services has a new Web site http://transport.tamu.edu).

Weis said in the future, all current transactions such as ordering permits, appealing or payng citations and making guest reservations will be offered online.

Transportation Services is also hiring a consultant to evaluate Transit Services (formerly Bus Operations).

The consultant will evaluate and help develop criteria for new bus routes, look at staffing lev-

els and make recommendations for what size and how many vehicles should be added to the fleet, Transit Services Director Gary Jackson

During the next five years, Transit Services will attempt to form a better relationship with Brazos Transit System to assist students without cars in traveling to places around the community other than campus.

"We want to be a more professional organiza-tion," Jackson said. "More like a transit organization in a city.

With the name and policy change, Weis said he hopes to improve the image of Transportation Services and move away from the untrue and inaccurate stories and perceptions he said some hold about the old PTTS.

"We hope that members of the community will begin to see our department as a service provider," Weis said, "and not a hindrance to conducting business or parking on campus.'

If the increase is approved by the Board of Regents, the UAT will rise to \$46 a semester hour, the maximum amount allowed by the state legislature, according to a University press release.
