created position of vice president for institutional diversity, he would make an exception to fill the position.

Bill Krumm, vice president of finance for A&M, told the Bryan-College Station Eagle Jan. 28 that the University had about 240 vacant staff positions.

The freeze does not apply to faculty. Gates has said increasing the pay and number of faculty was his top priority, and

that he would pursue it even if it resulted in spending cuts in other areas.

Before final spending decisions are made, those affected by the cuts will have the opportunity to plead their case, Gates said, and he will exercise discretion to protect programs or projects he deems vital.

He has vowed to minimize the impact of the cuts on student services and academic programs, and said possible spending cuts include postponing expensive equipment purchases and suspending consulting contracts.

The 12th student died over the winter break. Zacker did not know the circumstances surrounding the death and would not release the student's name.

The council is also looking for the people who sent the text messages to exam-takers, Zacker said.

Provost William Destler sent a letter to faculty members over

the weekend recommending they not post answer keys while an exam is ongoing. The school has no plans to bar students from bringing cell phones to class, Zacker said.

The number of Maryland students caught cheating has risen, from 97 cases in the fall semester of 2001 to 156 cases in the fall semester of 2002, Zacker said.

The use of cell phones is a new twist. Many phones allow text messages to be passed back and forth silently.

Bryan man arrested for attempted theft

The College Station Police Department (CSPD) arrested a 32-year-old Bryan man Thursday in connection with the attempted theft of an ATM machine on Greens Prairie Rd. on Jan. 26.

Booker Thomas Jones of 1304 Saunders was charged with burglary of a building and felony theft.

On Jan. 26, suspects attempted to steal the ATM machine from the Exxon Express Mart at 103 Greens Prairie Rd. The suspects broke the glass window of the Exxon building and wrapped a chain around the ATM machine, attempting to pull it out of the building with a stolen Suburban.

The CSPD believes two suspects attempted to steal the ATM, said Lt. Rodney Sigler, public information officer for the police department.

The suspects fled the scene in the Suburban without the ATM and abandoned the vehicle near the scene of the crime. A truck was then stolen from Curry Plumbing on Old Rock Prairie Road by the same group, Sigler said.

is not uncommon, said Steve Smith, archives director at Cushing Memorial Library. A&M also houses the archives of William Clements, a former governor of Texas.

After Gramm's announcement of his retirement, the A&M University System Board of Regents formally recognized his decades of public service with a resolution expressing appreciation.

The A&M library system feels that the storage of Gramm's archives on the A&M campus will serve as a great resource for students, Schultz said.

"Any member of the Senate creates a tremendous amount of material on a wide variety of topics," Schultz said. "No that material will be available for research."

The archives have been here for about a month, and they are currently at Evans Library being processed, said Les Stevenson, stack supervisor at Cushing Memorial Library.

Gramm became an assistant professor of economics at A&M in 1967, and was later granted tenure and promoted to associate professor in 1970. In 1971, he was promoted to professor and stayed at A&M until he was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1978.
