



the oil companies, and that is what this war is about. Russia and the U.S. have already started negotiations on splitting up Iraq's oil once the war is over," Steed said. "There's evidence right there. We haven't been attacked and by going in there we'll destabilize the whole region and open a huge can of worms.

Steed said he thinks the Bush administration is not considering the interests of all American citizens.

"One-third of our nation's homeless are veterans, and Bush wants to create more, even after cutting funding to the VA hospitals," he said.
