Police respond to suicide call and man is fatally shot

A Bryan man was fatally shot by a police officer Saturday morning after receiving a phone call from a psychologist who reported that the man had threatened suicide.

The four-hour ordeal began when police responded to a suicide call, only to find Daniel Edward Knudson locked inside his house refusing to come out.

The Bryan Police Department news release stated that Knudson's psychologist reported and threatened to take his own life by provoking a police officer to shoot him in self-defense.

Bryan police surrounded the home trying to contact Knudson and offer him medical and psychological treatment. During that time, the police held numerous telephone conversations with Knudson.

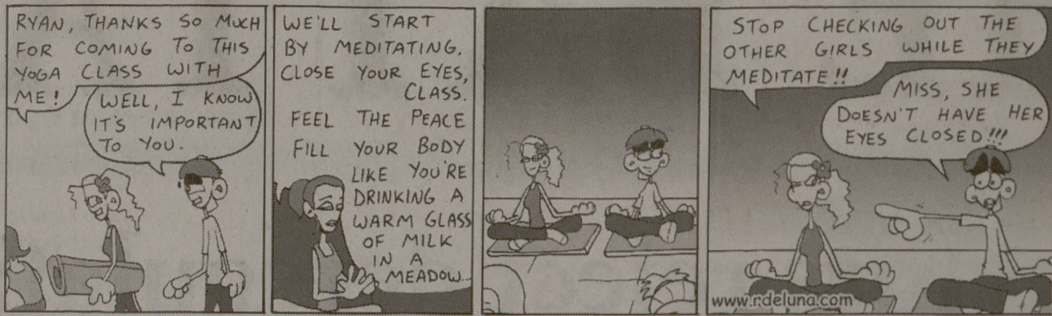
At 2:17 a.m. Knudson rushed out the door, bearing what looked like a "long gun" and pointed it at an officer in a threatening manner. Later investigators discovered the weapon in question was an air rifle.

After refusing to respond to the officers' verbal commands, police fired three shots and said one struck Knudson in the chest.

The officer involved in the shooting has been placed on paid administrative leave pending further investigation.

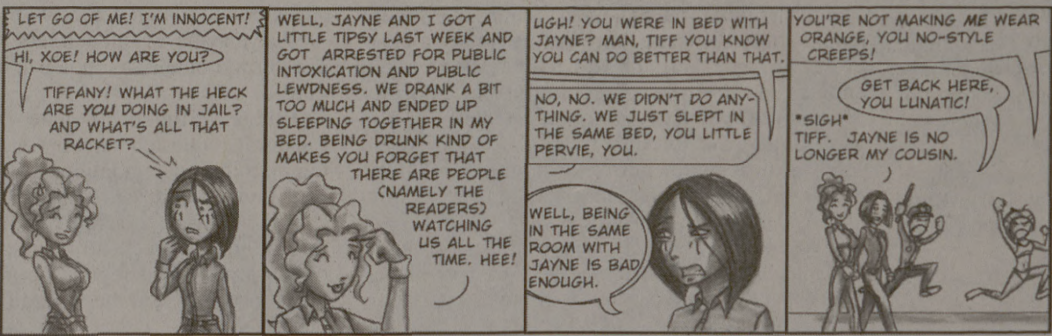

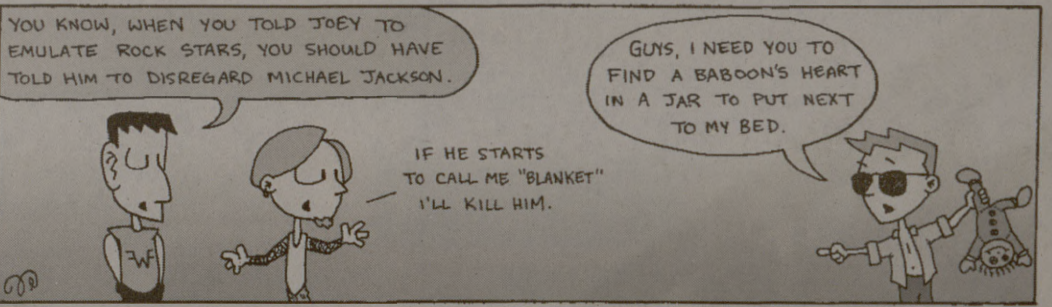
