The Ramones "We're a Happy Family: A Tribute to the Ramones" Columbia Records

Though not known for selling millions of albums, the Ramones have surpassed industry standards by influencing several of today's major bands. "The Ramones Tribute Album" features an impressive and diverse list of artists including Red Hot Chili Peppers, Pete Yorn, Rancid, Marilyn Manson, Green Day, Garbage and Tom Waits performing their favorite Ramones songs.

As pioneers of punk, the Ramones made three-chord melodies look easy by blending simplistic guitar and Joey Ramone's distinct vocals. Second generation punkers Green Day and Offspring follow suit on their flawless renditions of "Outsider" and "I Wanna Be Sedated," while Rob Zombie lends creative talent on his version of "Blitzkreig Bop." Kiss also does a suprisingly good job on "Rock and Roll Radio," keeping it fun and energetic.

Most of the tracks are worth listening to, but Tom Waits' take on "Return of Jackie and Judy" should be skipped because he sounds like a raving, drunken bum. Manson's cover of "The KKK Took My Baby Away" is also somber and disappointing, leaving little trace left of the Ramones' original. Any music fan can enjoy this album, but it is an absolute must for every Ramones fan.

Sum 41 "Does This Look Infected" Island Records

Armed with herds of teen admirers, Canada's punk pride and joy Sum 41 has come out with its third release "Does This Look Infected" in ample time to make up for Blink-182 and Green Day taking some time off. From its album cover, one can assume that the album's title refer to the state

album "All Killer No Filler" and its latest outfit, the band has graduated from song titles such as "Crazy Amanda Bunk Face" and "All She's Got" to less female-oriented, more thoughtful picks such as "All Messed Up and Over My Head." 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

Streep receives Artistic Honor

PARIS (AP) — Meryl Streep was awarded France's highest artistic honor, and she thanked the country for "loving women of a certain age — in movies and in life."

France's culture minister, Jean-Jacques Aillagon, named Streep, 53, a commander of the order of arts and letters, praising her "courage, delicacy, sensitivity and determination." He said she's been a star in France since 1985's "Out of Africa."

Streep thanked her fans in both French and English.

"Usually, America doesn't reward people of my age, either in day-to-day life or for their performances," she said.

"I hope they'll understand," she joked.

Streep and fellow American,

director Spike Lee, won honorary "Cesar" awards — France's equivalent of an Oscar.

Mills distraught over press criticism

LONDON (AP) — Former model Heather Mills says press criticism following her marriage to Sir Paul McCartney has left her "absolutely wiped out."

"The lowest point of my life has been since the press turned on me really badly, which sounds crazy," she said Saturday. "Now I'm at that stage where I feel absolutely wiped out."

For

Mills, who lost a leg in a traffic accident 10 years ago, said some newspapers had turned against her because she rarely opened up in public. The bad publicity had even caused manufacturers of prosthetic limbs to shun her, she said.
