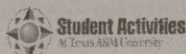

that will surround them would best communicate who an individual was.

University of Texas professor Stephen Daly, an expert in bronzes, serves as the executive artist and designer for the project. Shemwell said the sculpture project is an undertaking.

"There is not a collection of bronzes of this scale anywhere in the world," he said.

Shemwell said the team met with the families about a month ago in Houston to let them see the first portal and comment on it.

"They seemed very pleased with our results," he said.

The portrait artist for the project, Eric Christensen, will meet with each family before the cameo is cast. Christensen is based in the Texas Hill Country, and is one of several artists involved in producing the collec-

tion, Shemwell said.

Shemwell said the project is on an intricate schedule.

"The artist will be completing the cameos as quickly as possible," he said. "If there's any gap in the process at all, we won't make the deadline."

Shemwell said a time capsule is in the original design, and families and students would be allowed to contribute to it.

"The time capsule would be buried where centerpole was," Shemwell said.

Rosser said at this point there has not been discussion on the time capsule, and there has been no formal approval of the idea.

The site will be conducive to other ceremonies once completed, Shemwell said.

"I would not be surprised to see a new set of traditions built around it," Shemwell said. "Who knows what the future of Bonfire is, but this is the opportunity for one set of traditions to evolve into another."

Swisher County officials will not retry drug offenders

TULIA, Texas (AP) - Ever appeals court orders new for dozens of people in controversial drug Swisher County officials not prosecute any of them of the state's prosecutors.

Rod Hobson, a special prosecutor assigned to help the county during the ordered evidentiary hearing made the promise Tuesday hours after a judge recommended the drug convictions be overturned for 38 people prosecuted in a drug operation defense attorney claimed was racially motivated.

The judge also is recommending that new trials be ordered. "If the (appeals court) comes back, we'll do them," Hobson said. "It would be foolish for us to go forward."

The judge's recommendations came after several discussions between prosecutors and defense attorneys. Terms of settlement were not reached Tuesday because the Court of Criminal Appeals first sign off on the judge's recommendation.

Man arrested for 30 year-old murder

SIoux FALLS, S.D. (AP) - Federal agents arrested a man in the slaying of an American Indian Movement activist whose frozen body was found on a reservation more than a quarter-century ago.

Arlo Looking Cloud, 48, was arrested Friday in Denver. He was charged with the death of Anna Mae Aquash, according to Attorney James McMahon of Sioux Falls.

Aquash, 30, disappeared late 1975 from a home where she had been staying in Denver. Her frozen body, with a gunshot wound to the head, was found in February 1997 at the Pine Ridge reservation about 90 miles east of Sioux Falls.

The indictment of Looking Cloud remained sealed.

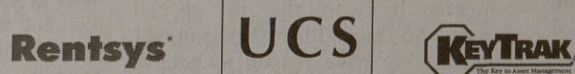
