

who say the project is more about race than history.

'(Memorial supporters) are trying so hard to find somebody other than a white male, and that's a noble effort, but I don't want to see history rewritten," said S Senator John Matthews. Student

Honoring Gaines with a statue seems out of proportion to his actual contribution to A&M, which was no greater than that of other legislators who voted for the bill, Matthews said. He also criticized the hurried pace of the project, and said the memorial council should meet more than once before presenting its recommendation to the Student Senate on Wednesday.

The A&M chapter of College Republicans, which had been the driving force behind the memorial in its early years, now opposes the project. Jeff Graham, chair of College Republicans and a member of the memorial committee,

Unlike the University of Texas, which recently placed a statue of Martin Luther King Jr. on its campus, A&M does not have to grasp for outsiders to honor blacks, Baum said.

Landgraf said the memorial council would suggest to the Student Senate what form the memorial to Gaines should take and how the funds could be raised. During the height of the Gaines memorial advocacy in mid-1990s, the College Republicans estimated a statue would cost more than \$200,000.
