American Airlines' \$1 billion lo Re

increases pressure on Carty

FORT WORTH, Texas -American Airlines is prepared to file for bankruptcy Thursday if it is unable to salvage cost-cutting deals jeopardized by employee anger over executive perks. according to two elected officials who met with management and labor leaders Wednesday.

The labor unrest has also increased pressure on the company's board of directors to remove chairman and chief executive Donald J. Carty, analysts said. The board is scheduled to meet Thursday.

American reported a \$1.04 billion first quarter loss on Wednesday as executives negotiated all day and into the night with labor leaders and four Texas congressmen to hammer out a deal and ward off Chapter 11.

Workers and union leaders remain outraged after learning late last week that American had approved executive bonuses and pension payments that would be protected in bankruptcy; early last week the unions agreed to \$1.8 billion in annual cuts. Now, two out of three key unions want to vote again on the concessions.

"If it is left unresolved, there's a pretty good chance the

board will approve a Chapter 11 new elections or to have the filing," said U.S. Rep. Martin ing completed much so Frost, D-Dallas.

Added Rep. Pete Sessions, a Dallas Republican: "Every available consideration that could avert a bankruptcy filing by American Airlines was looked at."

Frost and Sessions said a possible bankruptcy filing would be on the board's agenda on Thursday.

Unions representing flight attendants and ground workers want to hold new votes on the concessions, while the pilots' union is threatening to withhold formal approval. The unions were planning 30-day elections.


