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

rate cuts, increase the child credit and give married couples a bigger standard deduction, also wanted lawmakers to allow small businesses to expense up to \$75,000.

The White House continues to press for complete elimination of taxes on dividend income. Commerce Secretary Donald Evans met with senators Wednesday and told reports he wants to "get it to zero."

The dividend cut's hefty cost to the Treasury — nearly \$40 billion if constructed as the president wants — has proved troublesome for lawmakers with a limited budget for tax cuts. The Senate allocated less than the House to tax cuts, setting a limit at \$350 billion.

Senate Democrats complained Wednesday that the dividend policy will do little to put money in the hands of consumers. "It's clear that Republican leaders' top priority isn't helping hard-pressed middle class families," said Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D.

Others criticized ideas that shaved popular tax cuts for parents and small businesses to make more room for the dividend proposal.

"I am deeply disturbed by reports that the Republican leadership is willing to sacrifice increases in the child tax credit that support our working families to make room for president's dividend tax credit proposal," said Sen. Jim Jeffords, I-Vt.
