
LONDON — New research has revived the notion that a high fiber diet may protect against

ducted studies failed to find 1 benefit. But experts say two major studies published this week The Lancet medical journalone on Americans and the other on Europeans — indicate prev ous research may not have exam

ined a broad enough range fiber consumption or a wide enough variety of fiber sources to show an effect. "These two new finding

show that the fiber hypothesis still alive," said the leader of th American study, Ulrike Peters.


