Democrat, out of office.

Duncan says his constituents strongly oppose a Midland district, but he's searching for a solution.

Craddick, Duncan, House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Texas and Republican state Sen.

Todd Staples of Palestine, who authored the map under consideration in the Senate, met earlier this month to look for a compromise.

At the time, redistricting was gaining steam in the Legislature and both Craddick and Duncan were concerned that, whichever candidate won the expensive West Texas runoff, a new redistricting map could possibly eliminate the seat.

The agreement, Craddick said, would have given both Midland and Lubbock "pancake districts," stretching from east to west, so that either candidate would have the opportunity to maintain his seat after a redistricting map had been adopted.

Virginia was hit hardest by power loss. The state's dominant power provider, Dominion Virginia Power, said it was down to 900,000 homes and businesses without electricity Sunday.

"It will be multiple days," said Irene Cimino, a spokeswoman for Dominion Power. "We have an enormous distribution system have to be re — not restored, rebuilt."

At least 30 deaths are blamed on the storm, 17 of them in Virginia. North Carolina, Maryland, Delaware and Pennsylvania were declared federal disaster areas.

People were just realizing the full extent of the damage in Maryland, where nearly 600 customers were still without power.

Alice Evans, 60, was one of 79 hardy souls who stayed at Smith Island in Chesapeake Bay despite Maryland State Police efforts to talk them into leaving.

Evans, one of two teachers on the island, learned Sunday that Isabel had washed books and other materials out of the middle school.

"I hope I never have to live that again," said Evans, who confronted Hurricane Hazel on the island when she was a child.

North Carolina was reporting more than 130,000 power outages Sunday, and Bertie County Manager Zeb Lamb said Dominion Power officials said some residents in his county could be a month without power.

"They've just got a large territory to handle. We can't assume that sections at a time will be cut on," Lamb said.

On the Outer Banks, where the only road the length of Hatteras Island was washed out, local officials were trying not to think about the immediate future and instead focusing on getting things up to snuff for the 100th anniversary of the Wright Brothers' flight in December.

"We're going to be standing tall and proud on Dec. 17, 2003. I'll tell you that much," declared Carolyn McCormick, managing director of the Outer Banks Visitors Bureau. "It's the day that changed the world forever. And we're going to be ready for it."
