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

FDA seeks to deter fake medicine use

WASHINGTON (AP) Tagging bottles of pills with tiny transmitters may one day help keep counterfeits out of the drug supply, but until that or other protective technology arrives, patients must watch for fake medicines, a Food and Drug Administration offi-cial said Thursday.

"We need to raise the level of concern," said FDA pharmacy chief Tom McGinnis, who heads a new agency task force hunting ways to stop the growing problem of counterfeit medicine. Drug manufacturers are anxiously awaiting that task force's conclusions

Drug makers and sellers are urging FDA to consider a high-tech safeguard, tagging medicine with tiny radiofrequency chips that could let drugstores automatically tell the source of each bottle, McGinnis said.

Economy impacted by war on terror

WASHINGTON - Two years into the war on terrorism, hopes that the strugg would be only a brief drag the economy are fading Businesses and consumer are facing a growing list (security-related burdens, th federal deficit is ballooning from increased military spend ing and Americans are jitter about the future.

Many analysts believe that the first decade of the 21 century could well be a mirro opposite of the 1990s.

Back then, the coun reaped a huge "peace divi dend" as gushers of mone freed after America won the Cold War were diverted from the military to private enterprise.

Those business investme helped spur a record-long years of economic expansion and a surge in productivity levels not seen in decades. But now, Congress is deb ing President Bush's requ for an additional \$87 billion the Iraq occupation, and so ing spending on defense a homeland security brought back the era of massive budget deficits.
