displays the recovered mine and documents the history of the wars in Cambodia, a rehabilitation center for land mine victims, a shrine to those who were killed and a training center for mine removal. The home, offices and a souvenir shop will also be included in the new building.

Students' proposals were created to parallel the style of architecture found in the region.

"We did a lot of research on Cambodian architecture," Li said. "We wanted to create something that would belong to the area."

Gavos said many of the projects were designed with the buildings elevated because of monsoons that frequent the region. Also, students planned to use local materials to cut down on construction costs.

Rogers said Fitoussi's relief fund has received an \$85,000 donation from Hollywood director Tom Shadyac. Construction of the proposed structure is estimated at \$25,000 to \$50,000, excluding the cost to purchase the land, she said.

Fitoussi said the project should improve relations between the United States and Cambodia.

"We should start putting out fires," he said, "and rebuilding bridges in this time of terror and war."

Phelps showed the jury a photo of Bagby from the scene of the accident, paired with a picture of Bagby when she was alive, saying, "he turned this, into this."

Though members of the jury had seen photos of Bagby at the accident, several of them still turned away from the graphic photo.

College Station Police estimated Thompson was driving his truck at a speed of 97 mph. His blood alcohol level after the accident was three times the legal limit.

The jury also decided Monday

that Thompson's vehicle was used as a deadly weapon.

"This verdict is a balance between his interests and those of the community," Phelps said. "The risk is too great, and he told you earlier today that he cannot guarantee it will not happen again."

In his last statement to the jury, James said, "I want you to consider doing something to reduce the pain, reduce the tears."

As the defense asked for the least possible sentence of probation, Phelps was asking the jury for the maximum sentence.

"Sentence this defendant to prison for 20 years and a \$10,000 fine," Phelps said. "Help us save lives."

Pharmacist accused of forgery

ESPANOLA, N.M. (AP) — Walgreens contends a "renegade employee" may have falsified evidence in a lawsuit seeking millions of dollars from the company for a boy stricken after using a Walgreens prescription.

The lawsuit by Miriam Dunbar, filed on behalf of her son, Joshua, alleges the pre-

scription filled at the Espanola store for Joshua hyperactivity drug containing the narcotic methadone, which sent the boy, then 10, into a coma and caused permanent brain damage.

The company's accusation came in court documents filed last week after a former pharmacist at the store, Rick Mascarenas, had suggested during the first trial last month that Walgreens lawyer fabricated a prescription.
