

Peter Mansoor of the U.S. 1st Armored Division. "We revved up security measures based on those indications.

He said the FBI and Iraqi police were investigating. Similar investigations of seven other vehicle bombings, killing more than 140 people across Iraq beginning in August, have made no known breakthroughs.

Following Tuesday's clash in Karbala, Pentagon officials said the U.S. military is concerned about al-Sadr but is uncertain whether he poses a significant threat. The officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said they remain committed to disarming militias — including al-Sadr's declined to say whether they planned to con-

At his headquarters in Najaf, south of Karbala, al-Sadr demanded the Americans set a timetable for withdrawal. "Whoever cooperates with the occupation forces is not a Shiite. Indeed, they are not Muslims," he said. In other developments Tuesday:

-A spokeswoman for the U.S. 4th Infantry Division, Maj. Josslyn Aberle, said the military did not have any reports that Saddam was hiding in his hometown of Tikrit. This countered a statement Monday by a 4th ID officer that the deposed president was recently in the area.

-Insurgents launched attacks on Iraqi police in the northern city of Mosul, killing one policeman and wounding two others in a drive-by shooting, the U.S. military said.









