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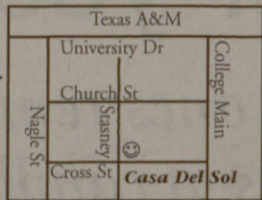

to replace Bonfire.

"Push Week is not about replacing Bonfire, but bringing back what it had," Sherrieb said. "How do you replace a 90-year-old tradition that meant so much to this University?"

He said the activities are meant to fill the void that has been left here, and that Fall Activities Council members feel that something needs to happen.

"We are trying to recreate the unity and spirit of Bonfire," Sherrieb said.

The first Push Week event, Reveille Ball, is a free, formal dance held in Reed Arena that is open to all A&M students.

"Reveille Ball is a free, fun opportunity to get dressed up and meet other Aggies in a safe environment," said Jennifer Kirby, chair of Reveille Ball.

Reveille Ball began in 2001 when the University held the 125th Anniversary Ball, Kirby said. A committee was put together and provided funds by the University to throw the first annual Reveille Ball last year, Kirby said.

"The goal of Reveille Ball is to promote campus unity and the family atmosphere that all Aggies share," Kirby said.

Damian Medina, former chair of Reveille Ball, said last year approximately 1,500 people attended.

"Reveille Ball, though open to all students, serves as a special opportunity for freshmen and sophomores to attend a formal dance because Junior Boot Dance and Senior Ring Dance are formally known as events for upperclassman," Medina said.

Reveille Ball tickets will be available at no charge at the MSC Box Office through 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.
