



Reveille Ball began in 2001 when the University held the 125th Anniversary Ball, Kirby said, A committee was put together and provided funds by the University to throw the first annual Reveille Ball last year, Kirby said. "The goal of Reveille Ball is to promote cam-

pus unity and the family atmosphere that all Aggies share," Kirby said.


