Dianne Clements, president of the victims rights group Justice For All, said it's difficult not having a clear state definition of mental retardation.

every opportunity they can to remove themselves from death row. If a defendant raises the claim, we provide them with super due process because of the law," Clements said.

Texas has about 450 prisoners on death row.

The Texas Defender Service, which represents capital murder defendants on appeal, has tracked the number of post-conviction mental retardation claims by death row inmates since the Supreme Court's 2002 ruling.

The state Court of Criminal

Appeals has sent 37 cases back to trial courts for hearings. Four cases were remanded by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.
