

Ma rotates 39 minutes slower th Earth every day, making Mars day 24 hours and 391 utes long. To keep the sci tists on schedule and alle them to live on Mars tin watchmaker Anserlian of Execut Jewelers in Montrose, Call created a Mars watch t Lemmon, along with the oth team scientists, wears to kn what time it is on Ma according to NASA.

The two rovers are on opp site sides of Mars, so while t sun is powering one of them, other is in darkness and res Scientists must work all hours the martian day to collect the maximum amount of data using rovers. The Ma Exploration Rover Mission so entists work long shifts, switch ing off only to eat and sleep f a few hours.

The mission will aid scientis in answering the age-old que tion regarding past life on Mars.

"Ultimately, with this an other missions, we want to know if Mars was ever Earth-like and capable of hosting life, or if has always been a desert world, Lemmon said.

This mission is important because it will change the way scientists study Mars.

"The questions we answering will shape all of the debates (about Mars) for a long time to come," Lemmon said "The tests we are performin may show Mars was warm and wet for some time, or they may show that Mars still looks like desert planet when you go to the places with the best evidence for water."

The study of Mars is fa from over. Many more mission are already in the works in continued study. Scientists II preparing to launch the Mars Reconnaissance Orbiter in 2005 that will take high resolution pictures of Mars and study its climate, Lemmon said.

Lemmon's contribution to the study of Mars does not stop wit the Spirit and Opportunity. H said he will also be responsible for operating the camera on the Phoenix spacecraft that will be launched in 2007 and will land on Mars in 2008.

NASA is also planning send a large rover to Mars and communications satellite to orbit Mars in 2009, Lemmon said.

Tickets to Lemmon's presentation on the accomplish ments of the Mars rovers and on sale at the MSC Box Office and are \$2 for students and \$3 for non-students. Each person will be given a pair of 3-D gog gles to view the pictures Mars that Lemmon will be dis playing.

"This is, of course, an exciting moment in the history of space exploration," sai Roland Allen, a professor of the A&M physics department "We are lucky that Mar Lemmon, who is also a Texas A&M scientist, is willing to give this presentation."

Dave Casey, a sophomo electrical engineering major said he is planning to attend the conference.

"If we are ever going to there we are going to need know a lot more about Mars that we do now," Casey said.
