## A&M men's tennis faces No. 7 Rice Tuesday

Coming off his team's first conference loss and with an important match against No. 7 Rice University at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the George P. Mitchell Tennis Center, Texas A&M men's tennis head mach Tim Cass has called on the West Student body for support

A&M student body for support.
"We need the student body to ome out and support us," Cass sid. "That's a call out, and ome wearing maroon shirts."

Cass understands what this match means as far as momentum and confidence and believes his team would benefit from the extra support.

The Owls (18-2) tore through their early season schedule compiling a perfect 18-0 record. Since then, however, the Owls have dropped two straight, losing to No. 28 Oklahoma State University and No. 58 University of Alabama. With their postseason tournament starting in less than a month, the Owls have not picked the best time to hit a skid. Rice hopes to change its downward swing as the team heads to College Station to take on the No. 25 Aggies. A loss against A&M (16-


7) would be its third straight heading into a tough home match against the No. 33 University of Texas. The Owls have not dropped three straight since last April, when they coincidentally lost to A&M, Texas and Oklahoma State.

"We lost some close matches that came down to the last point, but hopefully we'll refocus for tomorrow night," said Rice head coach Ron Smarr. "We've always had good matches against A&M, and I don't see why this one would be any different."

When asked about Rice, A&M junior All-American Ante Matijevic said his team need only worry about itself.

"(The losses) could mean that they're losing their confidence, but it could also mean that they'll come in more focused; I don't know," Matijevic said. "But it doesn't matter for us, we're still going to have to play our best to beat them."

Like Rice, the Aggies enter the match on a down note, as their five-match win streak was halted Saturday in a 5-2 loss to No. 2 Baylor University. It was the Aggies' first conference loss and only their second loss at home.

"We clearly need to get a good win, and Rice provides that opportunity tomorrow night," Cass said. "This team needs to experience a good victory."

The most intriguing matchup will be in doubles, where the nation's top two doubles teams, A&M junior Lester Cook and Matijevic and Rice senior twin

brothers Richard and William Barker, will face off for the third time this year after splitting their other two matches.

"If we play the Barker brothers, we just have to play the way we usually play – with a lot of freedom," Matijevic said. "I think we're a better team than they are, so we have

"This is the American dream come true," Pius Okafor said.

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
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
