### Garnett wins NBA MVP in a landslide vote over Duncan

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - Kevin Garnett got  $120 \, \text{tr}$ 123 first-place votes to beat two-time winner Im Duncan for the honor Monday, three days after his Minnesota Timberwolves won a playoff series for the first time.

Garnett's teammates attended a packed news conference at the Timberwolves' arena, and he praised them repeatedly.

"I wouldn't be nothing without those knucks heads, believe me," Garnett said. "It's a team game, and I've always kept that perspective."

He has played at an MVP level for years, but this was a breakthrough season for the Wolves. The earned the top seeding in the Western Conference playoffs with a franchise-best 58-24 record, the ended a string of seven straight first-round exits from the postseason by beating the Denver Nuggets.

"This is best situation I could ever think of o dream of," Garnett said.

Playing everywhere from center to point guad, the 7-footer averaged 24.2 points, a leagueleat ing 13.9 rebounds and 5.0 assists this seasonand his playoff stats are even better.

Garnett joined Larry Bird as the only players to average 20 points, 10 rebounds and five assists for five consecutive years.

He received 1,219 points in voting by sports witers and broadcasters in each of the league's cities. San Antonio's Duncan was next with 716 points and Indiana's Jermaine O'Neal finished third with 523. Peja Stojakovic and Kobe Bryant were next.
