

Labor board votes to send conflict to speedy arbitration

Behind the podium in Boston

BOSTON - The contract dispute between the city and its police union is headed to immediate, expedited arbitration, raising the possibility that the conflict will be resolved before next week's Democratic National Convention.

The state's labor management board voted unanimously Monday to send the issue to arbitration, where a ruling would be binding and cannot be appealed. But while the step suggested a resolution to the two-year-old disagreement, it also hinted at larger pro-

tests at the convention. The Boston Police Patrolmen's Association has been without a contract and has threatened to disrupt the convention festivities by setting up picket lines at events attended by Boston Mayor Thomas Menino, including the 29 delegation parties scheduled for Sunday night.

The police association opposes allowing a thirdparty arbitrator to resolve the dispute, saying that would usurp the union members' ability to vote on a new contract.

Union president Thomas Nee called the labor board's vote "absolutely outrageous," pointing out that the Joint Labor Management Committee voted on the matter last week and opted not to send the matter to expedited arbitration. Nee said

the union would escalate its protest for the convention and would reconsider its decision not to picket outside the convention site itself.

The police are asking for a pay increase of 17 percent over four years, while the city is offering

The labor board's 3-0 vote included members representing organized labor. panel assigned independent arbitrator Lawr Γ. Holden to report back with a contract Thursday. The convention is scheduled to July 26, four days later, at the FleetCenter.

Napster to offer music Dicker service deals to college state distance deals to college state again

LOS ANGELES - The company behind the Napster 2.0 online music service said Monday it has signed agreements with several universities to offer students its digital song subscription program.

Beginning in the fall, students at Cornell University, a CD. Full album downle The George Washington outside the subscription sen University, Middlebury College, the University of Miami, The University of Southern California and Wright State University will have access to the service through the schools, the company said.

The Napster deals are one of many steps colleges nationwide are taking to discourage illegal music file-sharing among students.

Like previous deals struck earlier this year by Napster with Penn State University and the University of Rochester in New York, the institutions will receive access to unlimited streaming and song downloads at a discount.

The universities are to set the price students mu pay for the discounted acces Penn State and the University of Rochester provide Nap service to their students at extra charge.

Students must still Napster's regular 99-centchi for a permanent download they wish to burn the son! start at \$9.99.

A Napster spokeswor declined to specify the extension of the discounts given to universities.

The company estimates more than 150,000 university students will be able to obt access to Napster throught schools in the fall.

Software maker Ro Inc. launched Naps 2.0 in October. The St Clara, Calif.-based compa acquired the Napster by from the ashes of the pioneer file-swapping vice, which was forced shut down in 2001 after protracted legal battle recording companies.
