research programs for Blinn and A&M students and improving roads in the Brazos Valley.

Senior political science major Lindsey Arms said Edwards misled college students in his discussion of tuition reforms.

"He seemed to make it sound like only people receiving government funding could go to college," Arms said. "Regardless of government funding, there are always opportunities for students to receive a college education."

Wohlgemuth said the distinction between her and Edwards is in philosophy.

"I am for tax cuts and limiting the role of government to leave money in the pockets of Americans. He has a tax and spend philosophy," Wohlgemuth said.

Wohlgemuth said this race is about values expressed and then validated by voting records. She asked voters to do their homework on each candidate's voting record.

"It's not about a single vote cast here and there," Wohlgemuth said. "It's about a body of evidence that has been built over years of public service."

Wohlgemuth said during her 10 years of service, she has consistently voted for and worked to promote the principles she believes define a conservative: limited government, individual liberties, free enterprise and traditional family values.

Edwards said he hopes Wohlgemuth will support additional debates.

During Wohlgemuth's legislative career, she has been named Distinguished Legislator by the House Republican Caucus, authored and passed House Bill 2292, and served as Chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee for Health and Human Services.

Edwards is serving his seventh term as a U.S. Representative for the 11th Congressional District of Texas and was named U.S. Legislator of the Year by the Association of the U.S. Army in 2003. He is also a 1974 magna cum laude A&M graduate.
